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1 DATA DESCRIPTION

The Global Land Ice Measurements from Space (GLIMS) is an international initiative with the goal of repeatedly surveying the world's estimated 200,000 glaciers. GLIMS uses data collected by the Advanced Spaceborne Thermal Emission and Reflection Radiometer (ASTER) instrument aboard the Terra satellite and the LANDSAT series of satellites, along with historical observations. The GLIMS initiative has created a unique glacier inventory, storing information about the extent and rates of change of all the world's mountain glaciers and ice caps.

Note: A GLIMS Glacier Viewer was developed to provide the public with easy access to the GLIMS Glacier Database. **A detailed description on how to use this web application and the text-based search option is given in Section 3 Software and Tools.**

1.1 Parameters

1.2 File Information

1.2.1 Format

GLIMS Data are available in several file formats:

1.2.2 Naming Convention

Each GLIMS download package can be ordered as a .zip or .tar option and all downloaded compressed folders will have the following file naming convention:

glims_download_XXXXX.<ext> where XXXXX is a 5-digit random order number and the extension is dependent on the zip or tar selection of the download order. An example file name is glims_download_08054.zip.

1.2.3 ZIP/TAR File Contents

All compressed files contain a README.txt and a CITATIONS.txt file as well as a number of different data files depending on the selected data format (See Table 2). All potential file contents are described in Table 3.

glims_images.*	<p>The files contain information on the images that are linked to the glaciers selected.</p> <p>Attributes include the glacier ID, analysis ID, instrument short name, original ID, acquisition time, and a flag called "est_loc". If this flag is 0, it means the coordinates listed are what are stored in the database. If the flag is 1, it means no coordinates were given, so the coordinates listed were estimated as an average of the other image coordinates in the package.</p> <p>If this file is not present, there were no images corresponding to the glaciers selected.</p>

1.3 Spatial Information

1.3.1 Coverage

GLIMS data is global but spatial coverage for individual download orders can be customized, for example, by zooming into a certain region in the map interface (See Section 3.1 Guide to using the GLIMS Glacier Viewer (map interface)).

1.3.2 Resolution

Polygons are created from satellite imagery with resolution (pixel size) in the 5-30 m range. The polygons are vector data and the positional uncertainty and their vertices are given in `loc_unc_x`, `loc_unc_y`, `glob_unc_x` and `glob_unc_y`. For more details on these parameters see Table 1.

1.3.3 Geolocation

All data are in the latitude/longitude coordinate system on the WGS-84 datum. The following table information for geolocating this data set.

1.4 Temporal Information

1.4.1 Coverage

Most data come from satellite imagery and are therefore post-1980, but some data come from mapping moraines. The general temporal coverage is currently 1850 – 2018.

1.4.2 Resolution

Time coverage is irregular and data entry dependent.

2 DATA ACQUISITION AND PROCESSING

2.1 Background

GLIMS is an international initiative with the goal of repeatedly surveying the world's estimated 200,000 glaciers. GLIMS uses data collected by the ASTER instrument aboard the Terra satellite and the LANDSAT series of satellites, along with historical observations.

The GLIMS initiative has created a unique glacier inventory, storing information about the extent and rates of change of all the world's mountain glaciers and ice caps. The GLIMS project at NSIDC has implemented a database of glacier outlines from around the world and other information about glaciers that also includes metadata on how those outlines were derived. The GLIMS Glacier Database was created from data contributions from many glaciological institutions, which are managed by Regional Coordinators, who coordinate the production of glacier mapping results for their particular region. The GLIMS Glacier Database provides students, educators, scientists, and the public with reliable glacier data from these analyses. New glacier data are continually being added to the database.

Closely related to GLIMS, and in the future converging with GLIMS, is the Randolph Glacier Inventory ([RGI 6.0](#)), a global inventory of glacier outlines. While GLIMS is a multi-temporal database with an extensive set of attributes, the RGI is intended to be a snapshot of the world's glaciers as they were near the beginning of the 21st century. The content of the RGI has mostly been integrated into the GLIMS database with the exception of a couple of regions. However, work remains to be done to make the RGI a downloadable subset of GLIMS, offering complete one-time coverage, version control and a standard set of attributes. Production of the RGI was motivated by the Fifth Assessment Report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC AR5). Future updates will be made to the RGI and the GLIMS Glacier Database in parallel during a transition period. As all these data are incorporated into the GLIMS Glacier Database and as download tools are developed to obtain GLIMS data in the RGI data format, the RGI will evolve into a downloadable subset of GLIMS, offering complete one-time coverage, version control, and a standard set of attributes.

2.2 Acquisition

Most data are retrieved from satellite optical imagery. Some data come from old geographical maps and some from mapping moraines with satellite imagery.

2.3 Processing

The processing is variable. Most processing involves image classification with the band ratio method and polygons are typically edited to correct small errors and to include debris cover when the satellite imagery is converted from raster to vector. Some data are the result of manual digitization.

2.4 Quality, Errors, and Limitations

For details on Quality, Errors, and Limitations refer to “Chapter 7 | Quality in the GLIMS Glacier Database” in Kargel et al. (2014). The uncertainty parameters in the data are `loc_unc_x`, `loc_unc_y`, `glob_unc_x` and `glob_unc_y`. For more details on these parameters see Table 1.

2.5 Instrumentation

Data are retrieved from TERRA/ASTER and LANDSAT-7 satellites as well as from ground-based observations.

3.1 Guide to using the GLIMS Glacier Viewer (map interface)

The GLIMS Glacier Viewer was developed to provide the public with easy access to the GLIMS Glacier Database. This Web application allows users to view and query several thematic layers, including glacier outlines, Regional Coordinator institution locations, the World Glacier Inventory, and more. GLIMS data can be downloaded into a number of GIS-compatible formats, including ESRI Shapefiles, MapInfo tables, GML, and KML suitable for viewing in Google Earth.

The GLIMS Glacier Viewer



The GLIMS Glacier Viewer is an interactive map which gives a view of data in the GLIMS Glacier Database. A number of different layers in this interface can be viewed and spatially queried including: GLIMS Glacier Outlines, other glacier databases such as the [World Glacier Inventory](#), Regional Coordinator Locations, and others. The GLIMS Glacier Outlines layer contains the results of glacier mapping within the GLIMS initiative. Each polygon in this layer represents the extent of a particular glacier at a specific time, as well as other possible features of the glacier such as the extent of debris cover or the location of supra-glacial and pro-glacial lakes. The GLIMS Glacier outlines can be downloaded as ESRI Shapefiles, MapInfo tables, Geographic Mark-up Language (GML) files, Keyhole Mark-up Language (KML, Google Earth), and the Generic Mapping Tools (GMT) multi-segment format.

Drag to pan the map. Use the mouse wheel, zoom-controls, or pinch gestures (on a tablet or phone) to zoom. Hold shift and drag a box to zoom to a region. Single-click to query visible layers.

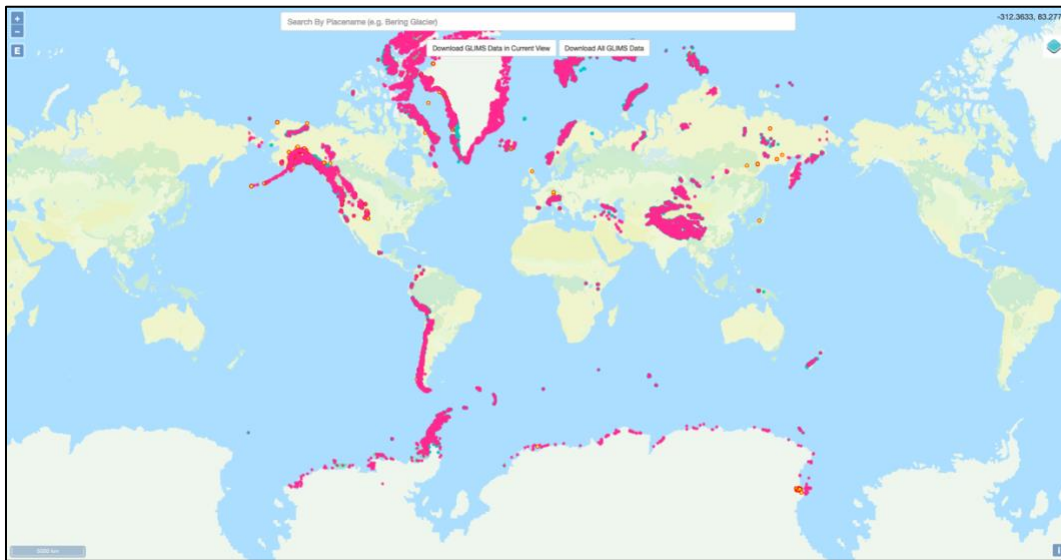


Figure 2. Screenshot of the Interactive GLIMS Glacier Viewer Map

This will open a map view; an example is shown in Figure 2. The following features are available in this interactive map:

- Use the mouse wheel, zoom-controls in the upper left, or pinch gestures (on a tablet or phone) to zoom
- Hold SHIFT and the left mouse button to draw a box to zoom into the map.
- Click on the 'E' in the upper left corner to show the entire world map
- Drag by holding the left mouse button to pan the map
- Hovering over the layer symbol on the upper right displays the map legend (See Figure 3), allows to show or hide different glacier databases and to choose the underlying base map.
- The search bar on the center top allows users to search glaciers by name.
- Right under the search bar are buttons to “download all GLIMS Data in Current View” or to “download all GLIMS data”.
- To customize the area of interest both, zoom and reshaping the browser window can be used to select a region (e.g. tall and skinny versus short and wide)
- A single click on an element displays a window with the available data for the selected item including Glacier Name, Glacier ID, Analysis ID, Area, AS-of Date, Source and an option to select more info. (see Figure 4)

3.2 Guide to using the GLIMS Text-search function

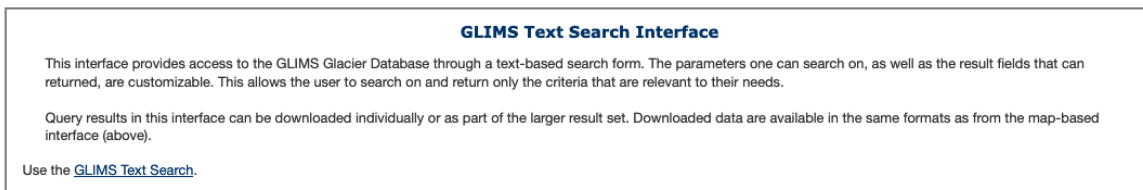


Figure 5. Access Page for GLIMS Text Search

A different option to search the GLIMS database is via the text-search based function. It can be accessed on the same webpage (<http://glims.colorado.edu/glacierdata/>) by clicking “Use the GLIMS Text Search”, see Figure 5.

This opens a parameter-based search interface shown in Figure 6. This allows for the search of glaciers by name, ID, country or other text-based information as well as to filter the database by glacier area, elevation, length, width, WGMS classification, etc. Another option is to search for data provided by a specific data center, data submitter, or data analyst. The search button will search the database by the given parameters and the reset button will reset the search form.

GLIMS Search

This web page provides a parameter-based method for searching for data in the GLIMS Glacier Database. Indicate what fields you want to constrain by clicking the corresponding checkboxes. Each glacier outline returned in a result set can be viewed or downloaded individually, or the whole result set can be downloaded as a set. You have a choice of several download formats. Data under embargo cannot be downloaded.

An example result list of glaciers is shown in Figure 7. This is the output when entering *Adamello* (a glacier in Italy) in the glacier name field. The results list displays glacier ID, glacier name, analyst ID, NSIDC- calculated area, source date, date available, analyst’s last name, and analyst’s institution. At this point, the user has the option to click the “download all” button or click on the “information icon” or “download icon” to the right of each listed data set.

3.3 Tour of GLIMS Data Info

Section 3.1 and 3.2 described how to filter GLIMS data via the map interface or the text search option, respectively. Both searches result in a list of results that have a “more info” option. Via the map, you click on the “more...” link on the right side of the results list (Figure 4); and for the text search, you click on the info icon under the “Options” column. Both results in display of the information with various tabs such as “Glacier Info”, “Submission Info”, “Analyst Info”, “Image Info”, “Map Info”, “Glacier Map”, “Hypsometry” and “Download”. An example display is shown in Figure 8. Each tab can be explored for more information on a particular GLIMS record. The “Download” tab with its options is explained in more detail in the next section.

3.4 Tour of GLIMS Data Download

There are several options to get to a download interface and GLIMS records can be downloaded individually or as aggregates. The following are some of the ways to download GLIMS data:

- After selecting an individual GLIMS record on the list provided by the text search (Figure 7) and clicking the “Info” icon, the download option will be on the top right tab (Figure 8) and link to the download interface.
- After selecting an individual GLIMS record on the list provided by the text search (Figure 7), the “Download” icon on the right side of the record will lead directly to a download interface.
- The “Download all” button at the right lower corner of the list provided by the text search (Figure 7) will lead to the download interface.

- A single click in the map interface results in a pop-up window, clicking on “More...” will show one record like in Figure 8 and the download tab will again lead to the download interface.
- A single click in the map interface results in a pop-up window, and clicking on “Download these GLIMS Glacier Outlines” on the top left will lead to the download interface.
- In the map interface, there are also the options “Download GLIMS Data in Current View” and “Download All GLIMS Data” on the center top (Figure 2) that both lead to the download interface.

Because the GLIMS Database is very extensive, a pre-defined set of attributes has been created to accompany the data. Not all fields are populated for all glaciers.

The downloaded data set consists primarily of polygons. For each glacier analysis there is a polygon that represents the glacier boundary and (where they are present) there are polygons representing the locations of internal rocks that are contained within the boundaries of the glacier. The internal rock polygons are attributed as 'intrnl_rock' in the line_type attribute field.

3.4.1 Data Format Selection

GLIMS Data are available in several file formats:

For each download order, you can select one of the above file formats. An archive file format (Zip or Tar) also has to be selected. Zip is the default selection.

3.4.2 Data Model Selection

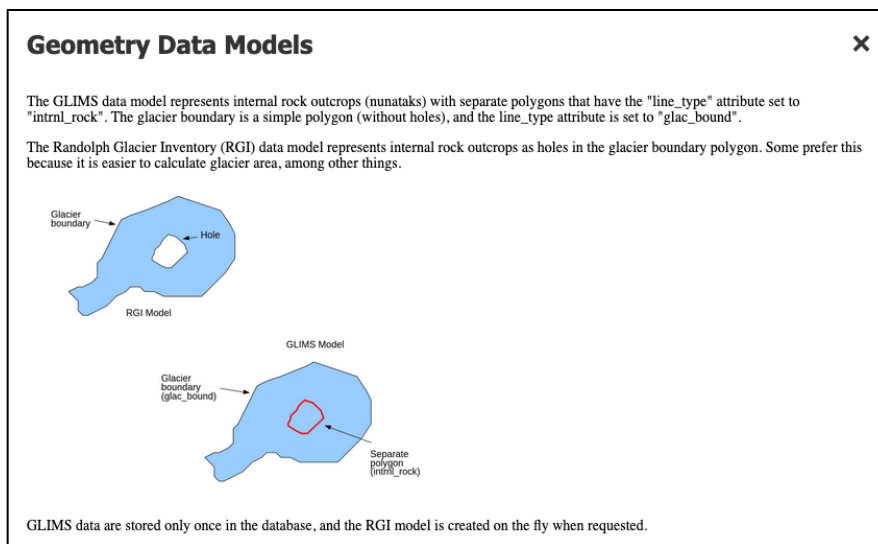


Figure 10. Geometry Data Model Options for GLIMS multi-temporal data

For the GLIMS multi-temporal data, there are two different options for internal rock representation. The “Holes” option represents internal rock outcrops (nunataks) as holes in the glacier boundary polygon similar to the RGI data. The “Separate polygons” option represents nunataks with separate polygons. Figure 10 details the two model options. A third option is available for snapshots in time where a date in yyyy-mm-dd format has to be entered.
